Meaning, Speech Acts, and Communication. 4 of (5) the speaker means both what the sentence means and something else as well. When he utters "The beer is in the frig," he means by those words just what they mean. Yet in uttering (5) he means more than just that, namely that the hearer may help himself to some beer.

Meaning, Speech Acts, and Communication

One difference is that the sounds or marks one makes in the performance of a speech act are characteristically said to have meaning, and a second related difference is that one is characteristically said to mean something by those sounds or marks.

Austin, on the other hand, tried to describe «the total speech act in the total speech situation» and warned against oversimplifying complexities of meaning, in particular, by reducing meaning to descriptive meaning:

The analysis of illocutionary acts is an example of the problem of the first kind; the study of indexical expressions is an example of the second. According to this use, speech act theory, together with the study of index ical expressions, make up most, or perhaps all, of the domain of pragmatics.

Pragmatic Aspects of Meaning II: Speech Acts

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In linguistics, a speech act is an utterance defined in terms of a speaker's intention and the effect it has on a listener. Essentially, it is the action that the speaker hopes to provoke in his or her audience. Speech acts might be requests, warnings, promises, apologies, greetings, or any number of declarations.
